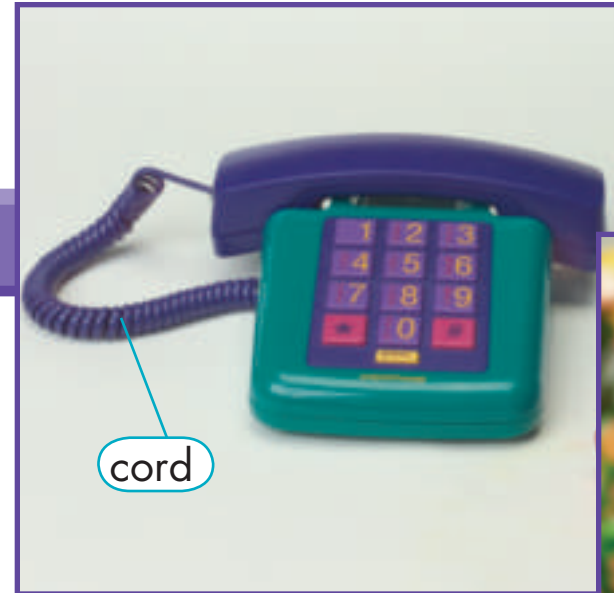



Today is a day for learning.
